

As a faith community, we are focused on transforming and strengthening our connections with each other, with the congregation's mission, with our spiritual center, and with the world. Forced changes of habit ask us to grow, to find creative ways of making meaning and fulfilling our purpose as a community. Though we cannot meet for our usual celebrations, the stories from this time of year about journeys through the wilderness, becoming liberated from old ways, and braving the underworld to make possible a new way of life are all relevant.



We are going to do our best to help as many people as possible get to the other side of this extended flu season. Practicing community care through physical distancing and proper handwashing are heroic deeds right now. Let's get together virtually as often as it is conducive to our emotional and spiritual wellbeing. There are modified RE classes for children moving online; some of our book groups and small group ministries are moving online; and I can help you set up a telephone conference call for your meeting if computer screens are not a good fit for your committee or church group.

Those of us who have a little extra to share can donate to organizations that equip and empower those who are most vulnerable: So Others Might Eat, Shepherd's Table, Maryland Food Bank, Beacon House, and other community partners have long been in relationship with under-resourced and unhoused neighbors. Within the congregation, I have been heartened by several generous donations to the Minister's Discretionary Fund, which will help us respond to financial emergencies of members and friends. Going beyond material support and toward dismantling the injustices that give rise to inequality, the Poor People's Campaign and Action In Montgomery are in high gear, organizing by phone and internet to pressure political leaders to make moral choices. Rather than re-inventing programs, we can do the most good by supporting those who are already engaged in missions of justice, equity, and compassion.

Though there are many things to sort through and challenges to overcome during this difficult time, I am grateful all over again to be serving the Unitarian Universalist Church of Silver Spring. Your agility and adaptability as a congregation is serving you well. Your care for one another is evident. Keep the faith, and may it bless and keep you.

Annual Budget Drive and Financial Contributions

We need each other now more than ever, and we need to rapidly transform our way of doing church so that we can stay connected and lend our strength to our broader community. Adapting takes commitment and resources. Even when the current danger is past, the world will be forever changed, and UUCSS must change with it. Now is the time to challenge ourselves to a spiritual practice of open hearts. Resist the scarcity thinking that comes with panic, take a deep breath, and imagine what we can do together with generosity. The way we do things will change as we adapt to the times we find ourselves in. We will transform and strengthen our connections with creativity and with new tools. What does not change is our mission, nor does our goal of doing business in a way that matches our UU values. We are not going to fail in our commitments to pay our staff, especially not our hourly staff, and your gift to the operating budget right now will help UUCSS to keep its promises. Hello, beloved community. These past few weeks have been anxious and stressful. Anxiety increased due to the lack of communication and guidance during the beginning of this pandemic. I have the deepest gratitude to all of those that worked to ensure that the most vulnerable of us would be protected.

By the time you read this, we will have experienced our third online worship service. Thank you for your flexibility and willingness to try new things. You were so willing to try new things that we ran out of space in the first online worship service. We have upgraded the Zoom account, so that should not

happen again. We had at least three visitors join our first online service. At least one appeared to stay for our first online coffee hour. We are a resilient and welcoming community and will continue to thrive.

Paraphrasing **Mr. Rogers**, "look for the helpers during crises." I have been heartened by the many helpers in the larger community. I'm referring to the world outside UUCSS, I expect you to be there, and you never disappoint. My neighborhood listserv has been filled with people coordinating help for the elderly and vulnerable. There are online coffee klatches, online playgroups, and planning gettogethers while maintaining distance. I live near the Matthew Henson trail and generally see clusters of people out walking. There are still people out walking, but they're keeping more distance. There are businesses that have decided to pay their workers even though they can't work. I intend to remember those businesses once I'm able to leave the house again.

We may not be able to meet in person, but we are continuing to get together. We're using Zoom for coffee klatches, our monthly ladies' night, the women's book club, and committee meetings. Currently, Zoom has removed the 45-minute limitation for their free accounts. These work for small meetings. If you have a larger church meeting, please contact me at president@uucss.org to coordinate use of the UUCSS Zoom account. Plan for some time at the beginning of the meeting to work through tech issues and introduce everyone to how to use Zoom.

Please continue to take precautions and practice social distancing. Look to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for guidance; the main link is here: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html. We will continue to hold online meetings, and by the end of this we will all be Zoom masters.

The work of the congregation continues. We are still in the midst of our Annual Budget Drive. If you haven't met with your steward yet, please reach out. Old-fashioned phone calls still work, and Zoom is always an option if you prefer face to face. Our online pledge form is here https://uucss.org/abd/pledge/. The agenda for the March Board meeting included discussion on next steps during COVID-19, finalizing Board goals for the strategic plan, and updates from the nominating committee and the Bylaws Revision Task Force (RevCon). Our lay sermons over the past few years have focused on a particular theme, and the result has been that all of us have benefited from thoughtful, meaningful sharing from fellow members. The idea of putting together a service may seem daunting, but a Worship Committee member will be responsible for coordinating and pulling together the parts of the service with our music team, our web team, and our office and communications folks. The Worship Committee person will also assist in leading the service with the lay member.

The committee welcomes offers from new members as well as those who have been with us for a while. Members who have shared in prior summers are welcome as well.

Our hope is that by July we will be able to have our services in the Sanctuary. If not, our first virtual service March 15th worked well, and we will continue with them, including our lay-lead services, as long as needed.

Message From Interim Director of Religious Education (IDRE) Marsha Thrall



March certainly provided challenges at UUCSS In a time of social distancing, as a community, it was inspiring to witness all of the ways in which wisdom came into play when planning Sunday worship. It has been equally wonderful to witness the ways in which adults have created spaces to gather, despite physical barriers. UUCSS working as a community to ensure that as many people make it to the other side of this pandemic has definitely been a witness to love in action.

April moves us into a season of a temporary, and different normal; and worship isn't the only space where adapting is necessary. Religious Education (RE) will continue to move forward as well. For the month of April, RE for children and youth will be facilitated in an online, small group format. We will be working from the *Soulful Home* materials, which is a family ministry supplement from *Soul Matters*. *Soulful Home* is not a curriculum; instead, it's a resource from which ideas can be drawn, providing both a classroom RE experience and activities and ideas that can be used to bring UU RE into the home. Next, as we navigate these times of social distancing, it feels important to continue to gather together, using the tools of technology that we have available, so that we can stay connected to one another. To help keep our kiddos connected to one another, I have scheduled the following recurring Zoom meetings to take place until the first week of May 2020.

- The PreK through 2nd grade group will meet from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.
- All other groups will meet from 6:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

To help make these check-ins be successful, I am hoping that one parent from each age group could sit in on the Zoom, so that we can adhere to Safe Sanctuary standards.

CENSUS 2020

Census results can determine the distribution of hundreds of billions of dollars in federal and state funds. We're talking hospitals, highways, stadiums, and school lunch programs. State and local officials also use **census** counts to draw boundaries for congressional, state legislative, and school districts.

BY APRIL 1: Remember to complete your census form online, by phone, or by email. Instructions are on the census form sent to your home.

During April: Census takers will visit college students who live on campus, people living in senior centers, and others who live among large groups of people.

May-July: If you miss the April 1 deadline, census takers will visit homes.

APRIL 8 ONLINE DISCUSSION

Join UUCSS Defending Democracy for an online discussion on Wednesday, April 8, at 7:30 p.m. We'll be discussing two films: *Suppressed: The Fight To Vote* and *Rigged: The Voter Suppression Playbook*. From strict ID laws to closing polling places to purging voter rolls and gerrymandering, the films document how these tactics make it hard for minority communities to exercise their right to vote and violate the central tenet of our democracy—"one person, one vote."

Suppressed: The Fight to Vote, a 38-minute documentary by Robert Greenwald, focuses on the 2018 midterm election in Georgia when **Stacey Abrams** fought to become the first black female governor in the United States while her opponent, Secretary of State **Brian Kemp**, was in charge of running the election. **Suppressed** interweaves the personal stories of voters across Georgia to create a narrative of voter suppression, which resulted in Kemp winning by 54,723 votes. **Suppressed:** The Fight To Vote," can be watched for free on YouTube: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=03DGjnlkTdl.

Rigged: The Voter Suppression Playbook, a 72-minute documentary narrated by Jeffrey Wright, chronicles the rising tide of voter disenfranchisement over the past decade, including the partisan use of gerrymandering and voter purges and the gutting of the Voting Rights Act by the Supreme Court. You will see real-time voter purges in North Carolina and voter intimidation in Texas. Available to stream on Amazon Prime.

MARYLAND VOTING NOW ON JUNE 2

The Maryland Primary has been delayed until June 2 in response to the coronavirus crisis. In announcing his decision, Governor Hogan said, in part: "I am directing the state board of elections to develop a comprehensive plan by April 3 to conduct the primary election in a way that protects public health and preserves the integrity of the Democratic process in our state." 



WOMEN'S BOOK GROUP



Volunteer of the Month Emily Harris Emily Harris was a regular churchgoer as a child but became disillusioned with religion as an adult, and after a family tragedy, rejected theism. There were still good memories of what a church could be—supportive, loving, nurturing—but dogma and prejudice got in the way. Seeing how church communities supported their family members, Emily and her partner, **Linda Barrett**, discussed how important a church community could be. Emily had briefly attended a UU church in Portland, Oregon, and thought Unitarian Universalism was possible. Vowing to visit all the local UU churches in 2013, they never got beyond UUCSS.

They were greeted warmly by **Dorothy Hale**, the rock band was playing, and they never looked back. UUCSS was a community that was loving, shared her values, and allowed her to be herself.

Emily's first church job was a natural fit—doing Sunday support with Dorothy Hale. Since then, she has done a variety of things: worked on the Membership Committee, helped with the auction, and joined the Rainbow Alliance. Her interest in music has flowered into membership with the UUukes and the a cappella group, both of which support worship services. One of the most meaningful things she's done has been as teacher of the fourth and fifth grades with **Patti Poss**. She likes kids, and nurturing young people fills an important need. Emily became co-collector in 2019, which fits well with her love of data and spreadsheets.

When asked why she volunteers, Emily said, "We have a wonderful community. It takes everyone, according to our abilities, to nurture it. We've had a few tumultuous years, and now it's up to us to make a way forward."

Charity of the Month

Shepherd's Table

In April, we'll be taking special collections for Shepherd's Table. Our longtime partner in providing meals to neighbors, Shepherd's Table is working on a community garden, which dovetails with our Green Sanctuary goals as well as our goals for addressing poverty.

Located in downtown Silver Spring, Shepherd's Table serves individuals from all walks of life experiencing a unique set of challenges, including homelessness, unemployment, mental health challenges, substance abuse, physical disabilities, and more. Shepherd's Table offers basic human services and provides a strong safety net for people experiencing homelessness. Along with partner agencies in the County, Shepherd's Table is working toward preventing and ending homelessness for all residents. Volunteers from UUCSS support Shepherd's Table by serving meals. This special collection will support expanding Shepherd's Table's garden, which will provide more fresh vegetables for meals and gardening training for clients.

Shepherd's Table began serving dinners in 1983, and now serves nutritious breakfast, lunch and dinner meals during the week, along with brunch and dinner on weekends and holidays.

Christina Moore, a chef at Shepherd's Table, built three salad tables last year to grow fresh greens in a small patch of land behind the building. Her vision is to add more salad tables and raised garden beds to grow fresh vegetables for the clients.

Recently, several volunteers built four more tables and mulched the area. Now they need funds to expand the garden, to purchase lumber for raised beds, soil, seeds, compost bins, and more. Shepherd's Table sees possibilities of more community engagement, with fellow gardeners teaching clients how to raise,

maintain, and harvest food. It is hoped that these clients will take the skill of gardening with them as they move into housing.
