#### December 24: 8:30 P.M. CHRISTMAS EVE CANDLELIGHT SERVICE



#### Interim Minister's Column by Rev. Lyn Cox



The winter holidays are, for some, an opportunity for awe. The twinkling lights, the stories of miracle and legend told in their faith tradition, the holiday foods are all invitations to marvel at the possibilities of this world, the potential for human strength, and perhaps the companionship of the Source of Blessing. As the nights get longer, a little bit of awe might provide us with a light at the end of the tunnel, or with the depth that enfolds us in contemplation.

For others, the winter holidays are reminders of deep pain. We sing about peace on earth, knowing that it is a far-off hope, and that disruptions in peace have already claimed the lives of so many of our kinfolk. We see advertisements about

family togetherness, knowing that our own families are divided by death or estrangement or distance. We have wish lists for housing security and food and health care, and perhaps a few simple pleasures, knowing that many people will not have that list checked off. Yet even in the midst of struggle, there are opportunities for awe. We lift up the people and the institutions that help others through difficult times. We hold reverence and wonder for the signs, sounds, and forces that sustain life despite the realities of brokenness.

In December, we attempt to weave all of these complex themes together in religious community. We follow some into joy, and we follow others into grief, and we follow still others into resilience and commitment. Worship, pastoral care, religious education, and social justice take the fullness of our lives during the holiday season into account. That we are bold enough to attempt to embrace all that we are and could be, and that our tradition gives us tools to do so, is reason enough for awe.

If the holidays are hard for you, I hope you will join the Lay Ministers and me for a special Blue Holidays healing circle on December 8 at 12:30. This will be a participatory, contemplative worship service designed to help people speak of and process their challenges with grief and other complex emotions around the winter holidays.

As you are thinking about being present with your neighbors during this dramatic time of year, please consider yearend financial contributions to UUCSS and to the Minister's Discretionary Fund (MDF). Catching up on your pledge (or making a pledge, if you haven't already) before the end of the calendar year helps keep the congregation going and helps us create space for the people who need an inspiring, welcoming, justice-oriented faith home. The MDF is a source for one-time grants to members of the UUCSS community for things like retaining housing, keeping the heat on, urgent medical care, or unexpected funeral expenses. The collection at the Christmas Eve service goes to the MDF, and you can donate to it at any time of year by writing "Minister's Discretionary Fund" in the memo line of your check to UUCSS.

In addition to having opportunities to support the congregation and our neighbors in the congregation, we have many reasons to celebrate. The Children's Choir is off to a great start for the season, and is leading us in learning a few songs by heart that people of all ages can carry with us throughout the week. Planning has begun for the Christmas pageant, sure to be heartwarming as always. This congregation is in a good place with respect to healing and spiritual growth, rising to the possibilities of the future.

We'll have a chance to discuss some of those possibilities at "Conversations for Liberation," scheduled for December 15 after the service. The Transition Team will help me lead a discussion about "the power of we" in Unitarian Universalism, what we value so much in Unitarian Universalism that we are willing to sacrifice for it, and how we will move our faith forward in greater justice. This is a discussion that UUs began at General Assembly and that congregations all over the country are participating in as we speak. Reflecting on the big picture dovetails nicely with the congregation's goals for the interim period. #### Message From Tamara Bowman, Board President

It was my privilege to take part in the Start Up workshop for our Interim DRE, **Marsha Thrall.** The meeting was facilitated by **Ann Richards**, who is a consultant provided—at no cost to UUCSS—by the Central East Region (CER). The Start Up provided space for us to discuss expectations for the coming year and learn more about how Marsha and UUCSS can work together. Conversation was lively and productive. For this year, Marsha will focus on religious education for children and youth while exploring possibilities for lifespan religious education.

Collaboration between staff and volunteers in pursuing the mission of the congregation is a major theme in the strategic plan, and one of the ways we will be doing that is through the

creation of the Committee on Shared Ministry (CoSM). The CoSM held its first meeting in November, with plans for monthly meetings from now on. The CoSM was established to assess whether we are following our mission and vision as well as to support the **Reverend Ashley Burczak**, our Community Minister, in reaching full fellowship. As our Community Minister, the work that Rev. Ashley does with JSS Hospice and as the chaplain at Riderwood is an extension of our shared ministry at UUCSS, so supporting her work is part of assessing and aligning all of the congregation's ministries with our mission and vision. This year, the CoSM will work on deciding which measurement tools would fit our congregation best.

Speaking of work that aligns with our mission, we have an opportunity for social justice engagement that aligns with all four of our major teams (Defending Democracy, Racial Justice, Green Sanctuary, and Rainbow Alliance). The Poor People's Campaign (PPC) originally began in 1967 during the Civil Rights era as an effort to draw attention to the poverty prevalent across all races. The campaign has been revitalized recently because the problems are still present, and because of the intersection of racism with other issues such as the war economy, environmental devastation, immigration justice, civil rights for LGBTQ people, and access to health care. The campaign calls for both parties to address an economy that isn't working for the majority and to address the racial inequality that continues to persist.

## INSPIRE (continued) President's Message

The campaign is a national call for moral revival culminating in the Poor People's Mass Assembly and Moral March scheduled for June 20, 2020. There are several ways that individuals and UUCSS groups can support the PPC). Individuals may volunteer for one or another PPC activities. The social justice committees may decide individually or together to work with the PPC on specific initiatives. As a congregation, UUCSS also has the opportunity to support the PPC. Look for a congregational meeting next year to make your voice heard. Until that time, there will be opportunities to individually participate in the PPC. Look for information from the social justice committees.

Living our mission in the world is sustainable because of the inspiration and renewal we bring to each other at UUCSS. Once again we will gather for Quiet Day, a day of spiritual practice and gentle adult religious education. On Saturday morning, January 4, 2020, we will gather in quiet reflective pursuits to replenish after the bustle of the holidays. Look for opportunities to participate and/or lead activities. Activities in the past have included movement meditation, journaling, nature walks, doodling, and yoga.

As of this writing, the Board is preparing for its November meeting. We will be hearing from the Search Committee, continuing the discussion for the annual budget drive (ABD) budget. The Constitution Revision Committee (RevCon) will provide an update. The Board will continue discussion on the communication goal for the strategic plan. The minutes and agenda for the Board are posted on dropbox for the benefit of the congregation.

#### Search Committee Update

Your 2019-2020 Search Committee brings you these updates on where we are and what's ahead:

#### **Congregational Record**

Right now, one of the primary focuses of the Search Committee is the Congregational Record. The Congregational Record is a compilation of facts and narratives covering our church history, membership and attendance, congregational demographics and beliefs, governance structure and programs, finances, paid staff, and the congregation's strengths and challenges. This document will reside with the UUA for review by ministerial candidates. We have integrated into the record feedback from last year's congregational survey and cottage meetings, this year's cottage meetings, and emails we received from the congregation. We built upon and updated the record developed by last year's Search Committee. We've submitted the draft Congregational Record to our UUA Transition Coach for her review, and we will be submitting the final Congregational Record soon.

#### **Documents Packet**

In addition to the Congregational Record, we submit the "Documents Packet." While the Congregational Record consists of our responses to a list of questions, the Documents Packet is...wait for it...a packet of documents. The packet includes documents such as our church constitution, budget, congregational covenant, Board meeting minutes, policies, organizational chart, photos of the church, and sample newsletters and orders of service. We are updating the packet now, and it will be finalized sometime in December.

#### Musings by Music Director, Michael Holmes,

We are now into December, the month of "Awe" according to the Soul Matters Sharing Circle. Lots of exciting music in store at UUCSS. On December 1, UUCSS welcomes back renowned UU composer/guitarist **Jim Scott** to lead both the music and the message that day. Some may remember the few occasions Jim has been with us as a guest musician, especially the two performances he did with the Sanctuary Singers of Paul Winter's Missa Gaia in 2007 and 2015. Jim will explore the themes of Peace and Awe as we head into the New Year. The UUCSS Children's Choir returns to perform for the service of Solstice on December 22, and the Sanctuary Singers will be in full form as usual on Christmas Eve! This year, Hanukkah lands after Christmas, and this gives our jazz musicians a chance to shine in some Klezmer jazz, led again by klezmer violinist **Susan Jones**.

December is often the most exciting month for musicians, as well as being frantic and daunting. In addition to our usual busy lives outside of music, our schedules are often crowded with an inordinate number of rehearsals, performances, and services. Like anyone, how do we allow ourselves to experience the sense of awe during this busy time? Very often, it's the music itself that gives us permission to experience emotion, when we otherwise may have controlled ourselves to keep our composure. One of the greatest feelings is transmitting that unleashed emotion that happens to us outwardly toward other human beings. In turn, we give the listeners a possibility to free themselves in direct or abstract ways. This is every performing musician's aim. I would call this transmission "spreading the happy virus."

# LEARN UUCSS Religious Education "Start Up"

This month, **Ann Richards**, the Director of Lifespan Spiritual Growth at Mt. Vernon Unitarian Church in Alexandria, Virginia, will be the guest Religious Education contributor to the Uniter newsletter. On November 16, 2019, Ann facilitated a Start Up workshop for Religious Education at UUCSS. During this workshop, both the congregational history and the history of Religious Education at UUCSS were examined as part of beginning the discernment process for the future of Religious Education at UUCSS.

Interim work is exciting! Doing interim work is by no means acting as a "placeholder" while the congregation lies in wait for its next settled minister, or next settled religious educator. Rather, as an Interim DRE, I have the unique responsibility of working with UUCSS to conceptualize, collaborate, and help create new direction—direction that works to build a sustainable religious education program that meets the changing needs of the congregation. In beginning the work to lay this new foundation, the interim DRE works to equip the congregation to maintain the momentum needed to continue the building process with the future settled minister, and future permanent religious education professional—making the transition easy for all involved.

I want to thank Rev. Lyn for having the foresight to know that a Start Up workshop was necessary. Thanks also to Ann for her hard work in preparing for and facilitating the Start Up workshop. But most importantly, I would like to thank you, the members of UUCSS, for valuing religious education, its future within your congregation, and for also trusting me with the exciting opportunity to be your Interim Director of Religious Education.

#### Report on the Recent Start Up Workshop at UUCSS by Ann Richards, Facilitator

It is very clear that the Unitarian Universalist Church of Silver Spring has a real and abiding dedication to its Religious Education program. While some congregations slip a new DRE in with a stealthy "nothing to see here" attitude, Interim Minister **Rev. Lyn Cox** and Interim Director of Religious Education (DRE) **Marsha Thrall** took the more thoughtful route of planning a Start Up workshop. Traditionally, a Start Up workshop is an opportunity for stakeholders to spend time thinking about the history of the congregation and how the RE program fits in it, to consider the tasks ahead, and to learn more about the new DRE and his/her goals.

The UUCSS Start Up was held on Saturday, November 16, and about 20 members of the Children and Youth RE Committee, the Board of Directors, the Membership Committee, the Volunteer Coordinator, RE teachers, and interested congregants attended, along with Marsha Thrall, Rev. Cox, and me. As the Director of Lifespan Spiritual Growth at Mt. Vernon Unitarian Church in Alexandria, a Credentialed Religious Educator, a Liberal Religious Educator (LREDA) mentor and lifelong UU, I was offered the opportunity to facilitate. I was excited by the prospect, and the event did not disappoint!

#### LEARN (continued) UUCSS Religious Education Start Up Workshop

After a reading of UUCSS' Religious Education Mission and lighting of the chalice, the workshop started with an interview of the Interim Minister and Interim DRE. Rev. Cox explained that Marsha's thorough understanding of theology, her experiences in seminary, and her time as a DRE at another UU congregation made her a great fit for Silver Spring. Marsha said that one element that particularly attracted her to UUCSS was its commitment to racial justice. Rev. Cox said she felt having two interim staff serving together had some advantages, in that they were both looking at systems and problem solving, and some of that work overlapped. Marsha talked about her central tasks as an Interim DRE, and how she would be working on religious education programs already running for children, but would spend more exploratory time on adult religious education, especially in the first year of her tenure. It was clear that a program for adults was of interest to a number of participants, and that spirituality was a topic that several would like to see explored with all ages.

A timeline of the congregation's history revealed a deep pride in leadership that UUCSS provided in the denomination when the Unitarians and Universalists joined, in supporting same sex marriage, and more. It also brought to light the resilience demonstrated through trauma and tragedy over the years. Participants also posted the date of their first attendance on the timeline, and we had both very experienced people (more than 30 years) and more recent attendees (in the last 5 years) at the workshop, a sign that religious education is important to a wide range of people at UUCSS.

Workshop participants also took some time to talk about events and experiences that were memorable and positive in their association with the church. Several people mentioned the importance of Our Whole Lives, Coming of Age, and youth programming to both themselves and their children. Others mentioned specific moments in RE classes, or spiritual experiences that had moved them.

Keeping these experiences in mind, we drafted a description of what we thought should be included in the Religious Education program. Participants listed:

- RE should be for everyone: children, youth, and adults.
- Learning should be ubiquitous; life made sacred by intention.
- There should be opportunities for internal and external reflection.
- The use and incorporation of the body is important in activities and spirituality.
- Religious practice is vital.
- UUCSS can be a space to support, draw out, cultivate, and discern your calling. It should assist in finding your calling and how it integrates into application in the community.
- Spiritual courage is important.
- All people should be included.

Writing a comprehensive description of the RE program was somewhat difficult, as several crucial issues had yet to be discussed. Being unable to address them all in the workshop setting, we wrote them down for further consideration. They included:

- Multigenerational worship (This is a regular feature of worship now, and some are not yet comfortable with it. Rev. Cox said this is something she preferred to address.)
- Multigenerational activities (These are done informally by groups who have an interest, and it isn't always clear who has responsibility year to year.)
- Multigenerational classes (Like the activities, it is unclear who would be responsible, and if there are enough volunteers and staff time to carry them out.)
- Adult religious education (Again, there is a lot of interest, but it is unclear how these would be organized and executed at current volunteer levels, with space limitations, etc.)
- Rainbow Alliance (There is a need for discussions about this.)
- Reorganization of the Religious Education Committee (to include adult and multigenerational programming?).

The workshop closed as we each contemplated what was ahead of us. Many felt hopeful, some curious, and our new Interim DRE said she was excited. That certainly bodes well for the future of UUCSS religious education! I wish you all well as you do this work together, and know that you begin with a mutual dedication to religious education and its important place in your community.

#### **Microaggression Workshop**

Save the date! **Charles Alexander** will lead a workshop on Understanding, Identifying, and Interrupting Microaggressions on Sunday, January 26, from 12:30 to 4:30 pm. in the UUCSS Sanctuary.

Racism and white supremacy are easy to identify when its purveyors wear white hoods, swastikas, and even MAGA hats. However these expressions of racism only scratch the surface of how racist and white supremacist ideologies, institutions, and systems are perpetuated and maintained. The problem is much more nuanced and subtle. Understanding microaggressions will offer insights into how racism and white supremacy persist, even in an environment where such ideals are rejected, and offer participants strategies and skills that interrupt the effects of subtle acts of oppression.

The number of participants will be limited. Look for registration information in December.




#### WOMEN'S BOOK GROUP


We will not meet in December. On January 27, 2020, we will discuss *Beneath the Tamarind Tree*, by **Isha Sesay**.
