June 2: FLOWER CEREMONY Catherine Boyle & Rev. Lyn Cox

The Flower Ceremony is a multigenerational Unitarian Universalist ritual celebrating diversity and cooperation. Each person will bring a flower. Together, we'll bless the flowers and admire their beauty. Each person will take a different flower home from the one they brought. We'll also celebrate a Bridging Ceremony for those who are graduating from YRUU and becoming part of the adult community. Please bring a flower to church with you, and plan to stay for the annual meeting after the service.

June 9: Courage for the Journey Rev. Lyn Cox

Living out UU values can mean many different things; fulfilling our mission means bringing together people with a diverse array of needs and gifts. Even with our many paths, most of us need a little extra courage now and then to continue on the quest. We'll welcome new members into the shared journey of UUCSS. This will be the last week of Religious Education mini-courses, and therefore the last week until September when school age children begin in the service (From June 16 through September 1, children and youth begin in their classes at 10:30), so don't miss the Message about bravery when faced with pale green pants.

June 16: Loving, Caring, and Fatherhood Preston Mears

Preston Mears will speak to our need to transcend the confines of traditional paternalism on this Father's Day to a much more exciting embrace of caring for all children. The theme for lay-led services this summer is "Living our UU Values," and that includes the too often neglected historic call to love all children whether adopted or genetically connected, whether of our social grouping or not. Preston will be assisted in the service by Bruce McConachie; grandson Isaac Mears will start the sermon singing the Cat Stevens song: "Father and Son."

June 23: The Spiritual Call to Authenticity: for Ourselves, for Our Culture, and for Our Planet Chloe Schwenke

Chloe will talk about what it means to be welcoming and affirming to transgender and gender non-binary persons. In light of recent political targeting of the transgender community, Chloe will also speak to what it means for a person of faith to be a true ally to transgender and gender non-binary persons at a time when this community is feeling very vulnerable. Present circumstances challenge people to open their hearts and prayers to people whose very presence can feel unsettling. This talk also calls on us to engage in the spiritual discipline of authenticity – to reach for that place where each of us can live at peace with ourselves, our identities, and our respective places in this world.

June 30: Both Sides Rev. Ashley Burczak

Following the white supremacist march and fatal attack on anti-racist protester Heather Heyer in Charlottesville, VA, President Trump stated that there were "very fine people on both sides" of the protests. This service will explore how we, as a faith, can balance the need to view evil with clear eyes and simultaneously to resist the demonization and dehumanization of others. (Rev. Ashley Burczak is a hospice chaplain with Jewish Social Services and is also the new UU chaplain at Riderwood Retirement Community She is UUCSS's Affiliated Community Minister.)

Interim Minister's Column by Rev. Lyn Cox

Living Our UU Values



There are many ways to bring UU values to life in our individual lives. Some of us create nurturing spaces at home or in the community where people can learn to become their best selves. Some of us serve as leaders, healers, teachers, or in some other calling. Some of us are peacemakers or peaceful troublemakers wherever we go, whether or not it's our full-time occupation. Practicing the Seven Principles is challenging, yet there are opportunities at every turn.

Congregations can support UUs as they live out their values. UUCSS is a laboratory for talent, encouraging members and friends to try new creative outlets, stretch their leadership skills, and practice group process. Worship is

meant to be comforting, challenging, transformative, and inspiring toward living UU values individually and collectively. Small groups and religious education for all ages helps us try out new ideas and consider new perspectives in ways that help us live our values throughout our lives.

One part of maturing as a congregation is learning how to keep getting better, as a whole system, at equipping members, friends, children, and youth for growing in faith and carrying the mission forward. We will keep working on this in our next year of interim ministry, as I am certain you will keep working on it with your minister the following year. There is always more to learn.

Another aspect of congregational maturity is learning how to live out UU values as a whole congregation together. How can members join together on congregation-wide shared ministry that helps participants grow in faith while advancing the mission of the congregation? What would it look like for there to be a congregational goal for every member and family to be working toward at the same time, each according to their capacities and talents? The Strategic Planning Team has laid some excellent groundwork for this. Shared ministry can continue to grow under the rolling strategic plan system, adapting from year to year.

Summer is often a time in UU congregations when lay leadership comes to the fore. This is great! Summer can be time when we practice sharing ministry, witness lay people's reflections and testimony from the pulpit, and send people forth for acts of service and spiritual pilgrimage. Let's also use this time to reflect on how the congregation is pursuing its goals and to make plans for the coming year about how we will live our values together.

Speaking of shared leadership, here's the pastoral coverage plan beginning June 10: The lay ministers will keep an eye on pastoral emergencies and will refer the issues that need urgent ministerial attention to either Catherine Boyle or me, depending on which one of us is in town. (We've arranged to be away at different times.) Barring such an emergency, I will be either focused on professional development or on vacation from June 10 until August 1. I'll be back in the pulpit on August 11. I have great faith in the lay ministers, in my

May this season bring you the peace that comes with living your values. May you have opportunities to make good trouble, creating waves for justice and kindness. May you return often to the congregation as a wellspring that helps you to grow in faith.

Message From Tamara Bowman, Board President



We have reached the end of the church year. Shortly after you receive this issue of the *Uniter*, we will have the annual meeting, elect our new officers, and approve our budget for the coming year. It has been a good year. We've made progress on goals we've set. We've tried new things and gotten more comfortable with change. We've supported each other. I am proud of the work our congregation does and I'm looking forward to another year.

One of the changes on the horizon are quarterly pledge and capital campaign statements. Starting in July we will be sending quarterly statements for pledges and capital campaign contributions. Look for the first statement early in July. Statements

will follow in early October, January, and April. We believe sending the statements regularly will help everyone stay informed.

The work of the Board goes on throughout the summer. We will be continuing our work reviewing policies and identifying areas where there are gaps in policy. One of the areas that has been identified as lacking, is safety. We have fairly comprehensive safety guidelines as part of the Religious Education (RE) policies, but nothing church-wide. Safety includes things like having a fire escape plan, fire drills, instructions on what to do if the buildings lose power, and how to communicate if there is a weather emergency, among other things. Stephanie McConachie, Board Vice President of Personnel, is coordinating the Safety Task Force to fill in these gaps. The Safety Task Force currently includes representatives from staff, Sunday support, Property, and RE. Please contact Stephanie if you would like to be involved.

As we wind up this year, there are still some unfulfilled positions for the coming church year. We are looking for a Catoctin chair and an auction chair. Both of these events are important to the life of the church and fortunately come with well-documented plans and many willing volunteers to support the chair. Please let me know if you would be able to take on one of these positions. The Catoctin retreat is September 27–29. The auction will be November 9. I look forward to hearing from you.

For current business, the Board meeting includes a report from the Search Committee. We will be reconciling the proposed budget with the collected pledges for the congregational meeting. We will be voting on the strategic plan, the conflict-of-interest policy, and the interim minister contract. I will report on the work the Board accomplished over the summer in the next *Uniter*, which will be published in September.

Have a wonderful summer; see you in church.

From Pablo deJesús, President, Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice (UUSJ)



As part of the National Week of Action To End Child Detention (from June 9–16), UUSJ, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), the Unitarian Universalists Service Committee (UUSC), and other UUs are part of a coalition with the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) mobilizing to close the Homestead Temporary Shelter for Unaccompanied Alien Children in Florida and beyond.

From your home or congregation, you can sign the petition to Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary **Alex Azar**; **Lynn Johnson**, Assistant Secretary at HHS' Administration for Children and Families; and **Jonathan Hayes**, Acting Director of Office of Refugee Resettlement before June

10. The petition asks to reunite children with their sponsors as quickly as possible and end collaborations with the Department of Homeland Security that interfere with reunifications, as well as close the Homestead Temporary Shelter for Unaccompanied Alien Children and stop using emergency influx facilities. The coalition wants to gather 100,000 signatures to deliver to HHS and members of Congress. The petition link can be found at https://www.uusc.org/initiatives/sign-our-partner-petition-close-the-homestead-child-detention-center/.

Letters can be written by children directed to the children in detention at Homestead, Florida. You can organize religious education classes to write letters, or have your children and grandchildren participate. The coalition will deliver letters to your members of Congress between June 10 and 14. An AFSC portal and toolkit is available at https://migrantjustice.afsc.org, with signups plus materials for children and youth.

Sunday, **June 9**, is the "Where are the Children" Pajama Clothesline Project (representing children separated from their families) as part of International Children's Day on the National Mall, Washington, DC, between 12th and 14th Streets, 10:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The UU Church of Columbia, Maryland, is leading this witness action.

On Wednesday, **June 12**, a coalition will visit Hill offices to advocate for bills in the House and Senate aimed at prohibiting federal funds from being used for emergency influx facilities (like the Homestead Detention Center) and prohibiting HHS from sharing information on potential sponsors of detained children with the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), which could use the information to deport sponsors. UUs for Social Justice

JUNE CHARITY OF THE MONTH National Center for Transgender Equality

The National Center for Transgender Equality (NTCE) in Washington, DC, works to replace disrespect, discrimination, and violence with empathy, opportunity, and justice by advocating for change to policies and society to increase understanding and acceptance of transgender people.

NCTE envisions a society in which transgender people not only survive but thrive, with accepting families and communities, full self-determination over their identities and bodies, and freedom from disrespect, discrimination and violence.

For this vision to become a reality, we must also create equity, equal opportunity, safety, health, and economic wellbeing for all people over their entire lifetimes. NCTE has several initiatives.

NCTE's Racial and Economic Justice Initiative ensures that the perspectives and priorities of transgender people of color, and those who live in urban and rural poverty, are part of the national policy and advocacy agenda. Currently, the Initiative's work includes reforming detention conditions for transgender people in correctional facilities and in immigration detention.

The NCTE Legal Network helps ensure that every transgender person can navigate the complicated name and gender change process and confidently address other legal issues they may face.

Voices for Transgender Equality (VTE) empowers transgender people and allies so that they can better advocate for transgender rights. VTE allows community members to connect directly with NCTE, to receive resources and opportunities as well as to help NCTE stay informed about transgender rights issues in communities across the country.

Families for Transgender Equality (FTE) is a network of families with trans youth, and groups that support these families, who all want to change policies and society to improve trans people's lives.

JUNE VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH CAROL HAMILTON

Carol Hamilton has identified as a Unitarian Universalist all her life. She came to UUCSS in 1996 in search of religious education for her 8-year-old daughter, **Yassi Davoodi**. She became involved in UUCSS, and she and Yassi enjoyed going to UUCSS's annual retreat at Catoctin, but as a single mother, she said "no" to frequent requests to volunteer, particularly for religious education. Then she left for 3 years to work at The Mountain, a UU retreat center in North Carolina. Upon her return, realizing she had said no to many volunteer requests,

she asked herself, "what do I want to say yes to?" Carol found that she enjoyed doing things that were different from the things she did all day professionally, and she enjoyed trying things out and learning new skills through church life. So, when she heard that the Board was going to engage in strategic planning (for the first time in a long time), she reached out to then-President **Maud Clarke** and offered to work on it. She became the chair and then a member of that first strategic planning committee, working with **Catherine Buckler**, **Mark Ferrenz**, **Jim Paoletti**, and **Phyllis Ryder**. She also became a facilitator of an Inreach group when they were first formed, which she facilitated for quite a few years; she continues as a member of an Inreach group to this day. She served on the Membership Committee and helped to reconfigure the membership process as a clear and standardized process for all those who wanted to become members. She also served on the Personnel Committee.

Volunteer of the Month continued


In or around 2012, Carol was elected to the Board and found herself named Interim President prior to her first Board meeting. She was a member of the Board that had to deal with the problem of two called ministers with different visions for the church. Although it was a very difficult and challenging process that lasted over several months, Carol was impressed with the quality of the discussion and discernment among the Board members as they struggled to come to the "best worst decision" they could. She then rounded out her tenure by serving as Interim President again in 2015 for the last 3 to 4 months of her term. Most recently, Carol has chaired the Search Committee, the members of which she considers a "really good group of people." Serving on different committees and the Board is a way to get to know people and learn their strengths, which Carol finds valuable. Between volunteer efforts, however, Carol deliberately takes a sabbatical. Carol encourages other members and friends to think about what church activities or opportunities they want to say yes to, and to step back after a period of service to recharge and to give other people a chance to step forward.
