Minister's Column by Rev. Kristin Grassel Schmidt



Dear UUCSS,

We head into a fall that is shaping up very differently from what we might have expected just a few short months ago. Nevertheless, I'm excited about so many things ahead here at church! Some of our plans are adapted from those made before the Delta variant surge began, but others have taken shape thanks to updates to the COVID guidelines made by the Board at their August meeting. We will be returning partially to campus, but we will have to do things differently than before. Things will feel different. We are different. With that in mind, here are some of the things I'm looking forward to in the coming weeks and months:

After nearly a year and a half of pre-recording worship services I am pleased to share that we are now working toward live-broadcasting services from the Sanctuary. A skeleton crew of no more than 12 people will begin leading and broadcasting them from the Sanctuary as soon as Sunday, September 26. We are also exploring fun ways people could gather outside while tuning into the live broadcast. Also, our Music Director Michael Holmes and I have been in close communication about how to create safe opportunities for people to make music together and plan to utilize instrumental music as well as special singer's masks as we move forward. We will be sharing more about our worship and music plans in upcoming all-church emails and service announcements, so please stay tuned!

Dr. Laura Solomon, our new Director of Spiritual Growth, is hard at work getting to know people of all ages, and she's developed a survey to better understand the congregation's hopes and needs for religious education programming this year. The survey will be sent out in an all-church email and includes questions about religious education for children, youth, and adults. I encourage everyone to take it. You are also invited to join us for one of two RE feedback sessions: Wednesday, September 1 at 7:30pm on Zoom (link on the church calendar) and Sunday, September 5 at 3:00 at Wheaton Regional Park (playground side). It's been a pleasure to begin working with Laura and I look forward to the ministry of spiritual growth that emerges through her leadership together with so many of you!

In many ways we are entering a new season of experimentation and innovation in all areas of congregational life. Safety precautions mean we will need to do some things differently than before. Most areas of congregational life will probably feel different. You may feel different. And as we've already had to do so many times since the pandemic began, we may need to pivot and adapt yet again. So, as your staff and lay leaders share plans for programming in this newsletter and beyond, please keep in mind these are based on current UUA recommendations, the best judgment of our leadership in this moment, and that circumstances may call us to adjust yet again sometime in the future.

I don't know what the year ahead holds, except that it holds promise and possibility. I'm so excited to be starting my second year of ministry together with all of you and I look forward to all of the ways we will embody truth, love, and justice together.

- We will do our best to support the efforts of Rev. Kristin and other leaders in making the transition to
 hybrid worship. We are constantly reviewing and revising our COVID-19 guidelines. As you've just read in
 Rev. Kristin's message, we're going ahead with live broadcasts from the Sanctuary, hopefully by September
 26, and we'll soon be announcing other changes.
- We will explore creative ways for us to gather--in person, as much as possible. Staying connected with one
 another is essential to building and nurturing our Beloved Community and to the mental and spiritual
 health of us all.
- To fulfill the congregation's charge to the Board in the 8th Principle resolution adopted last June, we will be embracing ways to "center the work of dismantling racism and other oppressions in all the work we do as a Congregation and to develop ongoing and evolving methods to assess and report our progress."
- We will investigate possibilities for communicating more often and more directly with the congregation.
 We want to hear your ideas about how to "do church" better, whether through brief, accessible reports about our proceedings, town hall meetings, or break-out coffee hour groups (by Zoom or in the Triangle Room). We have already scheduled two coffee hour sessions--on August 29 and September 12. Plus, you can always reach us at board@uucss.org.

I'll never forget Rev. Liz Maclay's admonition that members and friends who take on responsibilities aren't volunteering – they're serving the church! The Board policies we adopted in 2020-21 were designed to alleviate long-term volunteer burn-out and to facilitate new opportunities for others to serve the UUCSS community. Reconnection Small Group Ministry

Many of us began the summer of 2021 expecting things to go back to some version of "normal," but as we enter the fall. things still seem uncertain. Whether you're anxious for yourself or your kids about the Delta variant, eager to stop hearing about the pandemic and just get on with life, or just want to connect more deeply with yourself or others at UUCSS, this small group ministry might be for you.

Small group ministry is a style of circle worship for small groups. It allows each person a chance to share, if they choose, and to be heard and held by the group. These sessions allow people to reconnect in gentle ways that invite them to share at the level they feel comfortable sharing. We will cover the topics of relationship, joy, resilience, connection/community, and interdependence over the course of five weekly sessions.

Participants should plan to attend all five sessions. This small group ministry is open to everyone in high school and older. We need at least 6 participants to move forward and will create an additional group if more than 10 sign up. To sign up, please send Rev. Explore Your Leadership Style Four-Session Course on Leadership in a Faith Context

As we begin a new church year, are you ready to make new friends and get to know folks anew at UUCSS? Are you available to deepen your connection to our beloved congregation and explore how you can contribute more to our community? Do you want to grow or deepen your leadership skills? If so, we want to give members and friends an opportunity to explore their approach to leadership closer to home and are bringing leadership development programming to UUCSS.

For many years, we have asked members to step into volunteer roles without a lot of preparation. Some members have had the opportunity to attend leadership development training offered by the UUA through regional workshops, conferences, and General Assembly. As a first step towards intensifying the congregation's commitment to leadership development, the board reconstituted the nominating committee to be the leadership development committee to be able to consider volunteer and leadership development more broadly with the congregation. With this in mind, Jean Snell and Carol Hamilton will be offering a four-session workshop on leadership. Using an abbreviated form of the UUA curriculum, *Harvesting the Power*, through this class congregants will:

- Explore your leadership and faith journey
- Consider how to shift from an individualistic to a collective mindset
- Differentiate between leadership and management and why it matters
- Examine how to maintain your personal boundaries to avoid burnout
- Investigate what constructive conflict looks like

Who should attend: All members and friends are welcome! Whether you are considering a volunteer role within the church, elsewhere in the community, or in your profession, or whether you are already involved in some aspect of church leadership--we would love to have you!

Committee Updates

The Year Ahead from the Racial Justice Task Force

We begin our new church year as an 8th Principle Congregation, becoming the 97th Congregation to do so. Hurrah to all of us!! We thank you for taking this step together.

Last year, we explored what it might mean to consider antiracism work as part of our central Principles, as part of our spiritual journey. We committed to create and sustain a Beloved Community and to dismantle racism accountably in ourselves and our institutions.

This year, we begin that work together. We plan to start with a guide created for the UUA: Widening the Circle of Concern. The authors of this report were charged to "conduct an audit of the power structures and analyze systemic racism and white supremacy culture within the Unitarian Universalism Association," and they've created an overview of all layers of our faith and institutions. While the report is written about the national association, much of what is discussed applies to us at a Congregational level as well. The UUA Board has committed to review this report together over this year. The Racial Justice Task Force will also offer opportunities for the rest of us to dig in, review, and consider how these recommendations apply to us.

We will also be available to sit down with committees and groups within UUCSS to start imagining what it might mean to see this work through the lens of the 8th Principle. Over the past years, the Racial Justice Task Force and 8th Principle Task Force have developed relationships with congregations across the nation who have adopted the 8th Principle, so we won't be doing this work alone.

Finally, we are committed to engaging in this work with love and compassion. We know that to do the work of dismantling racism, we need to pace ourselves, and attend to our relationships with each other. Our work is urgent, yet it must be grounded in relationship and self-care, if we are to see it through.

We are excited for the year ahead.

Volunteer Spotlight Dina Raley



Dina Raley never quite fit in the Catholic church of her upbringing. It had always seemed forced, superficial, and unwelcoming. Most other churches seemed no different and so there was no attraction to religion. What changed was a realization that a church could provide community and be an outlet for social justice activism. She then did what any logical person would do and Googled "liberal church." Careful review of the search results showed a strong correlation to Unitarian Universalism. She and her husband, Todd, first fetched up at Paint Branch UUC but found it a little small with fewer outlets for activism. Shopping around, UUCSS seemed more of what they were looking for in a welcoming, authentic, and inclusive community.

Like so many others, Dina signed the book after attending her first Women's Retreat and has not looked back. Things she likes about UUCSS include the Coming of Age and YRUU services, the auction, and, of course, the Women's

retreat. She recently stepped down as our Membership Committee chair, where she gave new members the same warm welcome she received. Community Partner of the Month Afghan Women's Fund

Generosity is an important spiritual practice for Unitarian Universalists, and one we invite everyone to practice when making a pledge and when making offerings during Sunday services. We also strive to practice generosity as a whole community by giving a portion of the offerings we collect each month to a Community Partner organization whose work furthers our values, whether around the corner and around the globe. While we had originally planned to partner with another organization for the month of September, the escalating humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan calls us to shift our support to a partner with connections there.

Afghan Women's Fund is currently working with immigration attorneys to help their volunteers in Afghanistan whose lives are in danger because of their dedicated work supporting the rights of women and girls. Four Afghan members of the organization have already been violently attacked in recent days and many more are in hiding, in fear for their safety. The work of these Afghans in education and on behalf of women and girls places them in danger now that the Taliban is in power.

Our gifts will go toward the emergency evacuation and asylum support for the 50 volunteer members of the Afghan organization who are in danger because of their work supporting the organization's educational and vocational women's programs. Please keep the important work of the Afghan Women's Fund in mind when making your financial offerings this month.
