# Minister's Column by Rev. Kristin Grassel Schmidt



Perhaps the most wonder-full moments of my life have been the births of my children. There really is nothing else like holding a flesh-and-blood miracle for the first time, breathing in their intoxicating baby smell. The day before they had each been part of me, but the day they were born they were their own people. It made me feel connected to the generations that produced me, and to the generations that would come after me, through my children.

Several years later while on vacation I had another wonder-filled experience. We were at U Bar U, a UU family camp in the Texas Hill Country. Far away from most light pollution, more stars were visible than I'd ever seen with the naked eye before. It made me feel connected somehow to those far-away solar systems--and the

possible life forms on their planets, who might just then have been looking up into their skies wondering about me.

More recently, I've enjoyed the wonder of watching our kids grow and learn new things. The older two have built up some cooking skills, and it's amazing to eat food made by these children for whom I used to have to do nearly everything they needed to stay alive! Now the tea and soup they make me when I'm not feeling well makes me feel connected to my own parents in a new way, and I am in wonder of having this new shared experience with them.

Here at church, I've been filled with wonder and gratitude by this congregation's generosity and commitment. It's wonderful to see you get as excited as I am about completing our Community Building renovations, improving accessibility on our campus, and paying off the new mortgage early to free up more money in our yearly budgets moving forward.

Each of the experiences I just shared has filled me with a different kind of wonder. Each kind is meaningful, but they aren't the same. They are unique, special in their own way. Likewise, the different winter holidays each offer their own gateways into wonder. While a lot of the imagery in the stories at the heart of each tradition's celebrations is similar, each holiday is different, unique, and special because of that. And in our free faith, this diversity of meaning and wonder is a good thing!

Whatever holidays your family celebrates this time of year, I hope you are able, at least for a while, to tune out of the hustle and bustle and tune into the wonder of the season. # Contemplations from Rev. Caitlin Cotter Coillberg, Assistant Minister of Spiritual Growth



December is our fourth month of the new model of Religious Education, a great time to reflect on how things are going. Last month I did a series of listening circles, and I am of course also just excited to hear from folks via email or in passing about what is working and what they are longing to create.

We're deeply aware of the challenges we're facing with Religious Education right now--for our congregation and far beyond it. Limited volunteer capacity and low numbers are being experienced everywhere--we're all so tired at this stage of the pandemic, and it's hard to get volunteers and to show up for things. We've got the extra challenges here of limited space, limited administrative support and staff (we're still looking for nursery staff and an RE coordinator, if you know anyone who might be interested!), and of course figuring out a new

model to manage transitions and snacks and such.

Folks in our RE listening circles also named many joys: excitement with the new model and how everyone in the family gets something from it, the chance to connect with friends and then be together in the service (the profound joy of sharing space with babies and children in the service and hearing their noises was particularly mentioned). Folks are loving the reframe in the model toward intergenerational ministry. And they named that they like how this experiment in doing RE differently gives all of us the opportunity for grace--to forgive ourselves and each other as we fail forward into figuring out what works for us just now.

What do we need from Religious Education right now? What do we have the energy to do? Each of us as individuals, as families, a congregation? These are questions many Unitarian Universalists are wrestling with right now (I particularly appreciated this recent article from my colleague Evin:

https://www.uua.org/central-east/blog/better-together/where-are-children), and we'll continue to find courageous, collaborative, creative answers to them. In the meantime, I am looking for thought partners, teachers, nursery volunteers, and more!

Do you love superheroes? Have excitement around anti-racism work? Want to help me think through how best to create space for kids of all ages in the sanctuary? ## **UUCSS History: From Stable to Sanctuary by Jo Paoletti**

In observance of the 70th anniversary of the founding of UUCSS, Jo Paoletti is updating the history series originally published in the Uniter in 2017 and 2018.

It seems appropriate, as we are about to embark on a long-expected upgrade of our Community Hall, to share a bit of its history. For our first ten years, our congregation had land but no worship space of our own. The newly acquired property featured a small stable that was soon remodeled to serve as a meeting space and a spartan office for the minister. The work was entirely done by volunteers, including Rev. Dave McPherson, who recalled that a couple of old refrigerators are buried in a corner of the foundation.

My husband Jim and I visited the Rev. McPherson at his home in Ashland, Virginia, in the fall 2017. I wanted to know more about the first decade of our church, and Jim was curious about planning, funding, and construction of our first building, the present Community Hall. We had recently found a set of slides depicting a meeting, with the individuals posed in exaggerated attitudes of frustration and despair (See Left).

In one photo, Max Miller was sitting beside a building model that bore little resemblance to the Community Hall. Rev. McPherson had not been at that meeting, but he guessed it was around the time they had to abandon the original build plans due to lack of funds. It turns out that between 1955 (when they first started planning for a building) and 1964 (when the building was completed), they went through two architects (both church members, working pro bono), two sets of plans, and at least one detour into consideration of buying a different property entirely, where construction might be less costly. It was heartening, in a way, to learn that our history of building efforts has always been characterized by fits and starts.

Rev. McPherson wrote a history of the church in 1959 which has much more detail about these early years. Jo will post it to the Facebook group and to our Groups.io list so it can be enjoyed by all.
