March 5: Ours and Theirs: Navigating Pluralism, Rev. Kristin G. Schmidt

Unitarian Universalism has been pluralist for generations, and wisdom from other traditions is one of our named sources of faith. But putting these values into practice isn't always easy or straightforward. Join us this week as we consider our faith's approach to pluralism, and how we strive to relate to other faiths with humility and respect.

March 19: Wakanda Forever: Afro-Futurism, Vulnerability, and the Power of Black Panther, Rev. Caitlin Cotter Coillberg

This month a new exhibit celebrating Afrofuturism opens at the National Museum of African American History and Culture in DC. Just what IS Afrofuturism, and why is one of the centerpieces of this exhibit Chadwick Boseman's Black Panther suit? Join us for a service exploring these questions and inviting us to imagine a less oppressive, more liberatory world.

Minister's Column by Rev. Kristin Grassel Schmidt



One of the first things people ask a new minister is "What's your vision for our church?" It may disappoint some people to know that I have no specific vision for UUCSS, other than envisioning our future as one where we're deeply engaged in our surrounding community and functioning in more sustainable ways (financial, staff capacity, volunteer engagement, etc.). If I've learned anything in my dozen-plus years in this line of work, it's that ministry is contextual. In other words, what I might want for this congregation is less important than the difference this community of unique people are equipped to make in this particular time and place.

This month's worship theme is "vulnerability." It might seem an odd topic to delve into the same month as we revisit our congregation's mission

and vision, but there is a lot of wisdom where vulnerability and purpose intersect. Wendell Berry put it well when he wrote:

It may be that when we no longer know what to do we have come to our real work, and that when we no longer know which way to go we have come to our real journey.

The mind that is not baffled is not employed.

The impeded stream is the one that sings.

Healthy vulnerability means being able to be open about our growing edges, weaknesses, fears, and uncertainties rather than trying to hide or ignore them. In this way, it's connected to what Zen Buddhists call *shoshin*, which is usually translated as "beginner's mind." *Shoshin* is about setting one's ego aside, releasing any need to be an expert, and adopting an attitude of openness and eagerness, the way a curious new student would when starting to learn something new.

The truth is, the world has changed rapidly over the last few years, and no one really knows how to "do church" anymore. Not even the large congregations or so-called experts! According to Pew research, fewer people are joining congregations, and even those who consider themselves very involved in theirs attend less than half the time. Some of the larger congregations in the DC area have experienced such a shortage of volunteers they have had to hire paid RE teachers in order to sustain their programs. Let me be clear: as a non-coercive free faith, it's anything but a crisis for Unitarian Universalists to enjoy community, find beauty, do justice, or learn and grow in other places on Sunday mornings. But it's also not sustainable when our congregational programming and governance require higher levels of engagement than the data and our weekly attendance shows us is realistic to expect.

This month you will receive a special all-church email with lots of details about the different ways everyone can be part of the mission and vision process. Whether you are a long-time member, just started joining us for services last week, or are somewhere in between, I hope you'll plan to join us on Sunday, March 26, after

the service for our first all-church mission workshop. A light lunch and childcare will be provided, and it will be an opportunity for everyone to add their input and feedback.

And don't forget to join us for the Auction the week before on March 19!

As we begin this process to rearticulate our purpose in ways that resonate today, and as we discern the preferred future that truth, love, and justice are calling UUCSS to live into together, may we all practice "beginner's mind." Because even as patterns of engagement shift, even as the world around us keeps changing, UUCSS has precious and important gifts to share with a world that badly needs us to share them.

UUCSS History: The Miller Room, AKA The New Room AKA The Old Miller Room

Here at UUCSS, you can tell how long someone has been attending by how they describe the buildings. If they call the place where we hold worship "the new sanctuary," they've been around since at least the early 90s. I have had to resist telling people looking for the restrooms to turn left "where the turtle tank used to be". Then there is the "pianoless room," formerly known as the piano room.

Long ago, when there was just one building on this site—and it has been "the Fellowship House" ever since it was transformed from its original existence as a stable—we needed places to meet. Worship space, religious education spaces for all ages, office space for the staff, and meeting spaces. During the week, the Fellowship House could accommodate the minister in an "office" formerly the hayloft, and there was enough space for meetings and adult classes downstairs. On Sundays, the entire congregation, including children, gathered at local schools. The first few months we met at Rolling Terrace Elementary School; in December of 1952, the congregation moved to Hillandale Elementary School (now CHI), which was our home until we completed the first sanctuary building in 1964. During that entire time, meetings were held either in the Fellowship House or in members' homes.

Between 1964 and 1980, the space downstairs in the sanctuary (now the Community Hall) was used for meetings, religious education, choir practice, and the co-operative nursery school. According to Becky Hedin, who was nursery school director and a member of the choir during the 1970s, what is now "the Old Miller Room" was home to two-year-olds a couple of days a week. Because they sat on the floor and required little equipment, the room could easily revert to an adult-friendly space for the rest of the week.

Many articles in the Uniter refer to this space as "The New Room". This suggests that it did not exist when the sanctuary was originally built. In my imagination, I see the "open classrooms" typical of elementary schools of that period. The interior wall that created the "triangle room" upstairs was not part of the original plan, and the hallway in the administration building was added since I joined in 1982. Becky recalls that the "renovation" of the downstairs was designed by one of the nursery school moms who was an architect; the search continues.

In 1980, a covert celebration was announced in the Uniter. The New Room was to be dedicated to Max and Alice Louise Miller, two of the founders of the congregation. Alice was in on the plan, but only thought it was a party in honor of Max's 80th birthday. She could make sure he was there and would invite as many of the extended Miller clan as possible.

I realized while researching this story that the Miller Rooms—new and old—have had a special role in our church life. While I can appreciate the coziness of living room meetings, and the convenience of Zoom, the best gatherings—for me—are the ones around a table where I can rest a beverage, spread out my notes, or just bang my head if necessary. In recent years, the full-grown human sized furniture in our meeting rooms has been replaced by tiny chairs, and equally tiny tables, or no tables at all. Consider this my plea for a New New Miller Room that works for meetings, adult RE, and your humble archivist in search of a comfortable, convenient workspace.

Green Team Monthly Garden Tips

- Keep bird feeders clean & filled
- Finish any pruning of trees or shrubs. Not sure when to prune?

Click <u>here</u> for a tree pruning calendar Put off cleaning up the garden until the end of May. We have several species of insects that winter in the ground/or in leaf litter and do not emerge until May

- Let the violets and dandelions grow–they provide early nectar for our native bees
- Cut perennials stems and overwintering ornamental grasses to 8 inches above the ground.

Leaving these stems provides a place for spring & summer insects to lay larvae—the larvae will develop over the winter and emerge spring 2024

• End of March-plant cool season crops (lettuce, peas, carrots, spinach, kale, collards, etc.)

boys into the world, William and Brian. As with so many of us, having children became the impetus for finding a church and Jim and Emily found in UUCSS a good place to provide a religious education.

Jim left teaching last year to try something new when many of us would be looking at how to spend our retirement. He's taken his skills in teaching and doing things to become a seasonal park ranger for the National Parks Service. In his spare time, Jim likes hiking with Emily, playing senior level ice hockey, and fixing things. For the latter, UUCSS has been a beneficiary. Jim is the property committee chair, maintaining our physical plant and most recently shepherding repairs in the aftermath of the flood in our main building. He especially likes the camaraderie of working with folks to solve problems and seeing something tangible and meaningful for his efforts. Jim was also a co-chair of an annual budget drive. Asked what he'd like to say to the congregation, Jim said, "It's a great community with lots of really wonderful, engaging, giving, and caring people. Get in there and do stuff and you'll meet them."
